 - B. Identify gaps in knowledge: what services do they (the elderly or disabled) say they need. Ideas for finding out:
 - 1. go to nursing homes and ask
 - 2. ask at Adult-Day centers

Anne Hansen from the NE GA Regional Dev. Center said the #1 needs among elders are: prescription drugs help, home delivery meals, transportation, and personal care. Anne said she could get us information and stats. (this is something the community can really do!

- C. How can we break the cycle of poverty in this area?
- D. Care-Net is a coalition of community agencies looking at care-giver needs. (Only 1 yr old at R.Carter institute)
 - E. "Basic" services are provided b/c of older Americans Act of 1972(?); but it will never meet all the needs (services are based on need level)
 - F. Are we reaching those with greatest need?
- III. Disabled: can also be served by community care services program (CCSP)
 - A. Gaps: 1.disabled ages 21-60 (when the school system stops serving them)
 - 2. parents caring for adults with disabilities
- B. Planning for future of disabled child? (trust fund, future guardian, adult homes for after caring parent is gone...)
- C. Need: help parents plan for disabled child in the "gap" of services (after primary caretaker is gone.) also emergency planning
- D. Council on Aging is in the process of expansion

- B. Idea: Coupon system with cabs (there is already a system in another state where this exists. Get this info)
- C. GAP (clearing house for volunteers at UGA) (stands for Globally Aware and Active People)
- D. Idea: HOPE recipients do Service Learning as a part of maintaining scholarship (even just 10 hrs a semester could help with so many community needs!!!!!) Draft a generic letter
- E. How can we get the impoverished here? People that provide care? Elders????
- F. Visit and talk to residents at Denny Towers, Lanier Gardens
- G. Call Leisure Services about telling their Seniors that come to the Sr Centers. Call Athens Housing Authority.
