Partners for a Prosperous Athens Economy Subcommittee Data Summary

There are many local education, government, nonprofit, and business professions with a breadth and depth of local economy and poverty knowledge, including several area experts who have implemented U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development funding via the Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) to revitalize lower-income neighborhoods within Athens. The following information provides data for each element within the scope of work for the Economy Subcommittee.

•	Protect sustainable jobs	65% of all families that live in poverty in ACC are working
•	Address re-entering people from criminal justice system	The cost to incarcerate an individual in ACC is \$45/day (\$16,245/year). ³


 Impact of the regional economy on local employment Employment opportunities that will provide job skills, adequate health care, dependable transportation, child care and affordable housing 	Manufacturing has been and continues to be the cornerstone of NE GA's economy. However, just as the state and nation are facing decline in the manufacturing sector, so too is NE GA. Manufacturing exhibited the most dramatic change in industry share between 1990 and 2000, decreasing its share of all employment by over 5%. At the same time that manufacturing industry share was declining, the Services and Retail Trade industries were increasing. This regional trend follows the state and national trend towards a service-based economy. ⁴ ACC is a "housing-stress" county.

Research current market for existing jobs, desired jobs, wages, and pay scales	The official thresholds used by the federal government to determine "need" in 2005 were \$10,160 for an individual and \$19,806 for a family of four. However, local costs of living estimates for Athens-Clarke County range from \$29,709 to \$37,962, one and a half to nearly double the official poverty measure.


